

Meet John, the newest member of the WASK Board of Directors. We are happy to welcome him to the team.



"I am originally from Fairfield Center and now live in Oakland. I've been at Huhtamaki for 17 years. I am the Environmental, Health & Safety Manager at Huhtamaki, a position I've held since 2011. I believe in the mission of the Waterville Area Soup

Kitchen and hope to serve the community until such time there is no longer a need."

Todd Stevens

A new resource at the Lighthouse is Todd. He joined the Waterville Police Department in March as Community Outreach Coordinator, a new position created to serve people struggling with a number of issues: mental health, substance abuse, and other crises.

Todd works with this at-risk population and strives to connect them with organizations and agencies that can help. He visits the Lighthouse often, getting to know the people who visit there regularly. He monitors radio traffic and attempts to de-escalate situations before an official police response is required.

He has also visited some of the city's camps, learning of people's needs and working to find solutions. One simple example is when he provided rakes, city trash bags, and DPW pick-up to those who live outside, without amenities most take for granted.



Coming to Waterville after 4 years with Crisis and Counseling in Augusta, Todd has certification from the FBI and training in crisis negotiation.

William Anderson

Originally from Portland, William arrived in Waterville in 2019 to take advantage of housing through the VA. He first arrived at the Lighthouse last fall after losing that apartment. After 17 years drug-free, fentanyl, the scourge of our time, had him down. In fact, he openly shares that Narcan brought him back from the brink more than once.

Music is William's jam. It's the platform he uses to share himself and what he knows with those around him. What he wants to share most is positivity, acceptance, and recovery. At the Lighthouse, William found welcome without judgment and over the next few months, he reclaimed his life. And that life is so much more than addiction.



William is an army veteran, and the father of two. For a time, he was even Mr. Mom – a stay at home parent.

When he began healing, his guitar began to appear with him. Today, he is at the Lighthouse almost daily, and may be toting his guitar, a banjo, or a mandolin. His presence is a calming fixture. He probably knows the name of every person in the dining room, and he doesn't worry about what people think about him. "They probably don't, very much." It took many years but today William is comfortable in his own skin. And he is happy to do what he can to offer a similar peace and acceptance to others. Visit his Facebook page.
